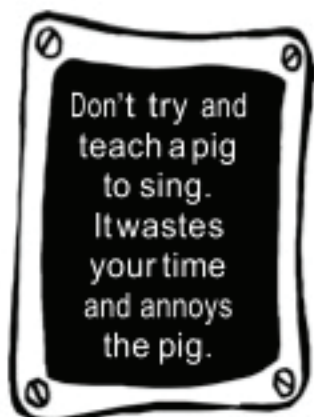




# BABE'S GRANBURY RESTAURANT FACTS



- The building was constructed around 1917, and originally assembled and sold Ford Model T's. It was also the first auto dealer in Granbury – in fact, the hydraulic lift used to work on those model T's, was found buried in the alley.



- The billboard in the back of the dining room features a painting of the Brazos River by Scott Lennox, a Fort Worth artist, poet, musician and public speaker. The painting is named "Brazos Fall". Scott believes in sharing the goodness he feels is still alive in the world through his paintings, music, poetry and public speaking.
- Granbury and Hood County are rich in Texas history. Davy Crockett's wife, Elizabeth, settled in Hood County in 1853 following the Texas Revolution against Mexico. Crockett, as well as other Alamo participants, received 640 acres in land grants. The Crockett family received land in what is now Hood County.

- At some point in the building's past, it began to fall down. A new roof was added along with the columns running the length of both walls, which also are tied to the outside walls to keep the structure together. The Cedar columns you see actually have metal columns running up the centers of them.



- The depressions and cavities in the Cedar are completely natural, and become exposed when the bark is removed. Cedar is known for its resistance to moisture, decay and insect damage. Cedar also has a unique cell structure that traps tiny pockets of air that act as a natural insulation.
- Our Honey is **TEXAS BRUSH HONEY** made from bees visiting Catclaw, Mesquite, White Brush, Huajillo and Persimmon. This should be good for local folk's allergies.
- A dessert of homemade biscuits with butter, honey and sorghum comes with your meal. This is a typical country dessert we grew up eating. **SORGHUM** (the jar on the table that isn't honey). Sorghum does not have the strong bitter taste of Molasses.
